

Each year, the City Manager provides an annual report to the City Council, residents and businesses of Santa Clara. As Acting City Manager, I am pleased to present the 2016 Annual Report and 2017 City Calendar.

If you want to sum up 2016 in the City of Santa Clara, it would be accurate to say it was a year of big moments. Starting with exciting Super Community events and ending with a municipal election that revised the City Charter and selected City leadership, this was a period of community involvement and change that will impact the future of this great city for years to come.

For many reasons, Santa Clara has had an international reputation for excellence for a long time but the historic Super Bowl 50 brought even more attention to the qualities of this city that

make it such a great place to live, work, visit and raise a family. The biggest, most complex annual sporting event in America went off without a hitch under the watchful eyes of millions of people around the world, and it generated a positive economic impact to our region.

Growing reserves

Speaking of the economy, 2016 was stellar in Santa Clara where companies and developers continued to invest in new projects and expansions. The 2016-17 City budget is balanced and includes investments in infrastructure and equipment, parks, and improved street maintenance, and staff in critical areas such as public safety. We have strong reserve accounts and the City's financial future is stable.

Another big moment occurred in June with the City Council's approval of plans for Related Santa Clara, the \$6.5 billion mixed use project that will be built across from Levi's®

Stadium. Although it will take many years for all phases of the new development to be completed, its potential for providing enticing new retail, dining and entertainment options for our residents – as well as new public open space, jobs and housing – is significant.

As always, it is important to recognize that the accomplishments of 2016 are the result of tremendous hard work by our outstanding City staff, volunteers and elected leaders. Annual Clean-Up Campaign is May 1-May 26, 2017

The Clean-Up Campaign is a service for the residents of the City of Santa Clara, not for people from other communities, contractors or businesses. Call 408-615-3080 weekdays or 408-615-5580 after 4:30 p.m. or on weekends if you see illegal dumping.

DO NOT set out your materials before the specified dates or you will be subject to a **\$100 fine**.

Place materials on public streets at least 3 feet from any obstructions such as fire hydrants, fences, poles, cars, trees, bushes or walls. **DO NOT** block sidewalks.

Not all developments participate in the Clean-Up Campaign. Unsure about your area? Contact 408-615-3080.

ACCEPTED CLEAN-UP ITEMS

- Only set out materials generated from your home and place only in front of your address.
- Old furniture, carpets, mattresses, toilets, plastic items without a recycle symbol, foam packaging, general household rubbish (not garbage).
- Appliances, tires and e-waste (anything that requires a plug or battery to operate). Set these items out separated from other rubbish for special collection.
- All construction/demolition debris and materials such as (but not limited to) interior insulation, gypsum drywall, concrete, asphalt, brick, pavers, rock, stone, dirt or sod **MUST** be set out in a bulk bag no larger than 1 cubic yard to prevent debris from getting into the storm drains. Failure to use a bulk bag may result in a \$250 fine. Construction bulk bags may be purchased online at bagcorpstore.com/cleanup or at the City Hall Utility Payment Counter, 1500 Warburton Ave., starting April 17. A total of 1 cubic yard of construction debris will be picked up at no charge. Additional cubic yards will be assessed at \$25/cubic yard.
- Wood, fencing, branches and brush cut into lengths less than 6 feet may be placed in piles parallel to the curb separate from other Clean-Up materials.

ITEMS NOT ACCEPTED

- **Recyclable materials** such as paper, glass, metals, plastics marked with a recycling symbol, cardboard or kitchen scrap metal. Use the weekly curbside recycling collection for these items.
- **Motor oil and filters** may be recycled by single family homes curbside. Label container with motor oil and tape the lid down. Place used oil filters in a leak-proof plastic bag. Place items by your recycling cart on your regular collection day.
- **Household hazardous waste** such as paint, pool/spa chemicals, automotive fluids, solvents, fertilizers, herbicides, cleaning products, compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs), sharps. Illegal set out of hazardous materials is subject to a \$500 fine.
Household hazardous waste can be dropped off by appointment only in the City of Santa Clara on Sat., April 29. Visit HHW.org or call the County Household Hazardous Waste Program at 408-299-7300 for more information.
- **Salvageable items** that could be reused or recycled. Instead, visit RecycleStuff.org or call 1-800-533-8414 for more information.
- **Ammunition and explosives.** For safe disposal, call the Santa Clara Police Department at 408-615-5580.
- **Prescription drugs.** Santa Clara residents can drop off pharmaceuticals at the Police Building. This free service is available by appointment only. For more information, or to schedule an appointment call 408-615-4727.

Week 1 – Set out materials no earlier than Sat., April 29 and no later than 7 a.m., Mon., May 1.

Note: Includes both sides of Monroe.

Week 2 – Set out materials no earlier than Sat., May 6 and no later than 7 a.m., Mon., May 8.

Note: Includes both sides of Homestead between San Tomas & Lawrence.

Week 3 – Set out materials no earlier than Sat., May 13 and no later than 7 a.m., Mon., May 15.

Note: Includes both sides of Newhall between Saratoga & Winchester, both sides of Saratoga between Scott & Pruneridge, and north side of Pruneridge between Saratoga & Lawrence.

Week 4 – Set out materials no earlier than Sat., May 20 and no later than 7 a.m., Mon., May 22.

Note: Includes the southside of Pruneridge between Saratoga & Lawrence and both sides of Pruneridge west of Lawrence and east of Saratoga.

2016-17 City Budget of Santa Clara

The fiscal year for the City of Santa Clara runs from July 1 through June 30. Proposed budgets for the new fiscal year are introduced at study sessions in May and June, and a public hearing is conducted before budgets are adopted in June. Information about current and proposed budgets can be found on the City website SantaClaraCA.gov, at City Hall and in the City Libraries.

Santa Clara's total budget for 2016-17 is \$753.6 million and includes the \$666.9 million Operating Budget (including the \$201.4 General Fund Budget) and the \$86.6 million Capital Improvement Project Budget. There are separate budgets for the Successor Agency, Sports & Open Space Authority, Housing Authority and Stadium Authority.

What you should know about property tax and sales tax

Although they are both important sources of revenue, the City of Santa Clara receives only a small portion of property tax and sales tax.

- The City of Santa Clara receives \$10.28 of every \$100 collected in property tax.
- The City of Santa Clara receives \$1.00 of every \$8.75 of sales tax collected.


Who shares property tax

MySantaClara is a great place to raise kids

Plans for a new soccer and recreation facility were approved by the City Council in 2016 and construction is expected to get underway in 2017. Located at Reed and Grant Street, the new park will include up to five soccer fields, a Community Recreation Building, playground, picnic area and parking for 215 vehicles.

In 2017, more detailed plans will be finalized for another new park on the corner of San Tomas Expressway and Monroe Street that will include a community garden, playground, bocce court, grass meadow and picnic areas. It is expected to open in 2018.

The City Library launched the “1,000 Books Before Kindergarten” program in 2016 to encourage parents to read with their children. Every year thousands of Santa Clara youngsters participate in learning and enrichment programs at the Library and through the City’s Parks and Recreation Department.

All Santa Clara children are welcome to be part of musical productions produced throughout the year by the Roberta Jones Junior Theatre. Everyone who auditions gets a part!

MySantaClara wants me to be healthy

The Santa Clara-San Jose-Sunnyvale metro area has the highest life expectancy in the U.S. – 82.7 years – according to an analysis conducted in 2016 by 24/7 Wall St. The report attributed this achievement in part to access to parks, recreation and other places for physical activity.

The City of Santa Clara helps residents live long and prosper through its commitment to expanding parks, playgrounds, sports centers and the San Tomas Aquino Trail. It is recognized by the League of American Bicyclists as one of only 404 “Bicycle Friendly Communities” in all 50 states.

Central Park Library is a weekly pick-up location for subscribers to local programs for fresh, organic food and sustainably harvested fish. Both the Library and Parks and Recreation offer classes on healthy cooking, and a weekly Blood Pressure Clinic is held at the Senior Center as part of its emphasis on health and wellness for older adults.

The City of Santa Clara contracts with the Healthier Kids Foundation to provide youngsters with vision, dental and hearing screenings and to help uninsured children obtain health coverage.

MySantaClara inspires learning and innovation

University of California, Santa Cruz opened a satellite campus in Santa Clara in 2016, joining Santa Clara University and Mission College in providing higher education opportunities for residents. For younger students, ground was broken in 2016 for three new public schools (elementary, middle and high school) that will serve families in North Santa Clara. They will open in 2019.

In 2016, the City of Santa Clara launched an innovative partnership with Santa Clara Unified School District called “Rising Readers” that provides free access to an award-winning literacy app for all young learners in Santa Clara. It includes 1,000+ English and Spanish books, songs and games.

With more than 10,000 in attendance, the STEM Bowl in January 2016 was the biggest event in the City Library’s history with the Library Comic Con coming in at a close second with 9,000 enthusiastic patrons crowding through the doors. The STEM Bowl was honored with a California Library Association PReXcellence Award for its outstanding engagement with the community.

MySantaClara plans for the future

Specific plans are being developed for four key areas of Santa Clara – Tasman East, Lawrence Station, El Camino and Downtown – so that future proposals for these neighborhoods match the City’s priorities for housing, office and commercial developments. Multiple community meetings took place in 2016 and will continue in 2017 to gather resident input before decisions are made.

As new developments are proposed for Santa Clara, residents are encouraged to follow their progress on the Development Projects Story Map and Database on the City’s website, an innovative e-government service that received a 2016 Award of Merit from the California Association of Public Information Officials (CAPIO).

Prudent financial planning is a core value of the City of Santa Clara and its budgeting process and financial reporting were honored with Excellence Awards in 2016 from both the California Society of Municipal Finance Officers and the Government Finance Officers Association.

MySantaClara protects the environment

Silicon Valley Power, the City's municipal electric utility, celebrated 120 years of service in 2016. The award-winning utility announced that by 2018, Silicon Valley Power energy will be coal free, cutting in half the carbon intensity of the power it provides to Santa Clara.

Santa Clara received two awards in 2016 that reflect its ongoing commitment to protecting the environment: a Tree City USA and Growth Award from the Arbor Day Foundation and top honors from the Santa Clara Valley Urban Runoff Pollution Prevention Program in the National Municipal Stormwater and Green Infrastructure Awards Program.

The largest public multi-standard electric vehicle charging facility in California opened in Santa Clara in 2016 inside the City's Tasman Parking Garage. It includes 48 Level 2 chargers and one DC Fast Charger. In addition, seven Level 2 charging stations for electric vehicles were installed in the City Hall parking lot.

A new public art piece, the Super Bowl 50 commemorative sculpture “Anything’s Possible,” was unveiled across from Levi’s® Stadium in 2016, bringing the total number of public art and statues in the City of Santa Clara to 18. Residents and visitors enjoy touring the art pieces using the story map on the City’s website to find their locations.

In 2016, the City of Santa Clara finalized plans to close portions of Franklin Street and Alviso Street adjacent to the Santa Clara University campus so that it can become part of a pedestrian mall bordering the new Art and History building, the centerpiece of the University’s developing arts district.

With several active local arts groups – including visual arts, music, theater and dance – as well as City sponsored cultural arts activities and public performances at our local colleges, Santa Clara residents have access to dozens of free and low cost entertainment options throughout the year.

MySantaClara feels safe and secure

Public safety is a high priority in Santa Clara and the City employs more than 1,000 professionals and support staff in the Police, Fire and Communications (dispatch) departments to make sure that residents, visitors and people who work at Santa Clara businesses are safe.

In 2016, Santa Clara was named the 11th safest city in America in ratings compiled by Niche, a company that maintains statistics on cities. The rankings analyzed the incidence of violent and property crimes compared to population.

Multiple programs to prevent crime, fire and accidents are offered to residents and business owners each year, including Neighborhood Watch, emergency preparedness guidelines, and crime and fire prevention presentations to community groups. Safety tips are also included in every issue of the City's newspaper, *Inside Santa Clara*.

City staff from some departments are on standby 24/7 to help residents when needed whether it be a sewer blockage, street flooding or a cooling center when temperatures are too hot.
