

- Developers are responding to mixed-use architecture

- It is Seen in Every Corner of Every City in Bay Area






SONOMA'S LEDSON HOTEL

 Development





- The Façade is Identical to Santa Clara's Demolished Theatre





Case Study: Mountain View Creation of a "Place" Not a "Project"

- "One of the things we learned was that we were planning a *plαce*, not a *project*
- A neighboring city ...saw downtown as a project, and they tore down their traditional downtown and replaced it with a project – a regional shopping mall.
 - The mall later failed and was replaced, and it is now in the process of being replaced again
- We feel we did better because we saw our downtown as a real place for people, not a shopping mall."

Case Study: Mountain View Advise From Those Who Did It

- Stay with traditional downtown basics
 - "Beware!: Many developers are accustomed to suburban shopping mall standards..."
- Make it compact
 - A downtown's appeal: close together within a convenient walk
 - Invite Gatherings/Parades
- Mix it up!
 - Traditional downtowns: mix of retail businesses below and residences/offices above AND DIFFERENT ARCHITECTURES
- People living and working in your downtown = fewer people and cars that need to be imported for success

Conclusions/Next Steps

- Our Goal: Meeting The Desires of Santa Clarans to Bring Back Their Downtown
- A Community Wide Effort:
 - We want to meet with all affected parties (Current Business Owners; the Quad Group; etc.) to discuss and get inputs/solutions.
- Our first point of concern is all Current Franklin and Lafayette Business
 Owners as Well as Current Tenants
 - All MUST be protected.
 - Potential Solution Build in Stages: The first stage's Construction in the current open parking lot.
 - Once Phase 1 is completed, the current retailers can "turnkey" into the retail space they want.
 - Once they are relocated, we can then tear down the 1960 structures and continue with Phases 2/3/4.
- Mixed Use: Residential and Retail:
 - It can be and IS being done WITHOUT it being a "Santana Row:" we want a
 downtown NOT a Mall.

Conclusions/Next Steps

- Financing of the development:
 - The construction of Residences can bring in a staggering amount of revenue to finance the retail beneath.
 - Retail: few developments have the luxury of @ 10K students hundreds of yards away.
- Next Steps:
 - What are our Collective next steps to make this happen?
 - How can our group help to make this a reality?
- Santa Clara WILL BE One of the First Cities in America to BRING BACK THEIR DOWNTOWN from scratch
- Santa Clara deserves its heart back
 and this growing group will see it Gets Done By 2022
