Proactive Steps Taken

- 8-27-20: Meeting with SCU Staff regarding the upcoming school year.

Strict Enforcement Model

Since noise is a main concern the PD is taking a tough stance

- In the past often times first offenses were warnings. Significant education provided to students at start of year to explain enforcement.
- NSU Officers are still using a progressive enforcement model but at time we are issuing citations on first offense when noise is late or excessive.
 - Common citation is **\$300** for disturbing the peace and amplified music.
 - Fines increase based on additional responses and can rise to the level of **\$1000+**



Strict Enforcement Model

Property Owners Cited

- In an effort to keep property owners in the loop on what is occurring at their property.
- Many property owners tack on administrative fees before passing the citations onto residents.
- This allows property owners to take action if necessary.

Citation Statistics

Citations total:

- ***\$4250 in fines***
- *\$303 per citation*
- *Goal is not to produce money, but to change behavior and bring peace to the neighborhood*



Blue Tags

- When a property has been identified as a “Nuisance” it can be blue tagged
- Each subsequent police or fire response is \$1000 minimum
- Blue tag must remain posted on residence for 90 days
- Four blue tags issued last year, none so far this year

IMPORTANT NOTICE REGARDING PUBLIC NUISANCE


PURSUANT TO SANTA CLARA CITY CODE CHAPTER 9.05, THE NEXT DISTURBANCE AT THE PREMISES WILL RESULT IN MONETARY PENALTIES IMPOSED UPON ALL PARTICIPANTS AND SPONSORS OF THE EVENT, AND ALL PROPERTY OWNERS OF THE PREMISES.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT on _____, at _____ a.m./p.m., the Santa Clara Police Department found that a public nuisance caused by a disturbance of the public peace and/or threat to public safety occurred at the premises located at _____.

If there is a subsequent event on these premises that constitutes such a public nuisance and necessitates the intervention of the Police Department or Fire Department on or before _____, every participant in and sponsor of such event shall be jointly and severally liable for the monetary penalties connected with this response (any subsequent event at the same premises, which necessitates City intervention, shall result in a fee of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00)). If there is a subsequent event on these premises that constitutes such a public nuisance and necessitates the intervention of the Police Department or Fire Department within one (1) year from the date of this notice, the occupants and owner of the premises shall be jointly and severally liable for the costs connected with any subsequent response.

Superspreader COVID-19 event at Keuka

48 students infected so far by off-campus party; distance learning started Monday

KEUKA PARK – An off-campus party is reportedly the “superspreader” COVID-19 event which has now caused a widespread outbreak among the students of Keuka College. As of press time Monday afternoon, Keuka College reported 48 students have tested positive.

Yates County Public Health initially reported late Thursday that 10 cases of the Coronavirus had been detected on the campus. Deputy Director of Public Health Sara Christensen said, “We continue to investigate a cluster of cases at Keuka College with 10 new cases received today. We are working closely with the Administration and the Health Center. We will provide an update tomorrow as we continue to our investigation and contact tracing efforts.”

By the next day, that number had risen to 18. By Sunday, it was 34. The 48 cases now reported at the campus raise Yates County’s number of positive cases to over 110. With the Columbus Day holiday.

- Monmouth University switched to online instruction after explosion of cases
- President said on Friday there were 291 cases, up from 39 on September 25
- Increase in cases was tied to an 'an off-campus event' hosted by students
- College near the Jersey Shore will continue remote learning until fall break

A college in New Jersey has seen an explosion of **coronavirus** cases following an off-campus party that became a suspected 'super-spreader' event. Monmouth University, located close to the Jersey Shore, switched to remote instruction after cases rose to 291 on Friday from just 39 on September 25, university President Patrick F. Leahy said in a letter to the campus. 'It appears that this increase in cases among students was tied to an off-campus event hosted two weeks ago,' Leahy wrote, without offering further details.

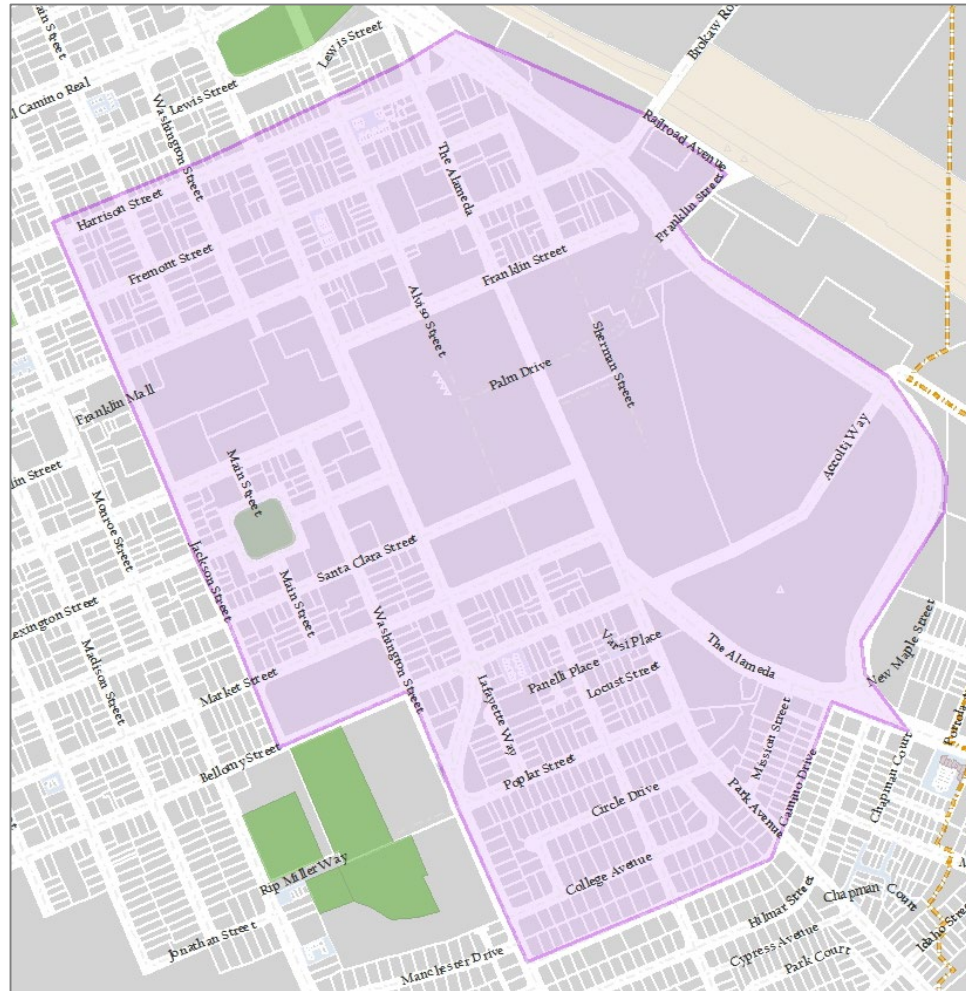


COVID Enforcement

- Task force conducts follow up and issues administrative citations to property owners

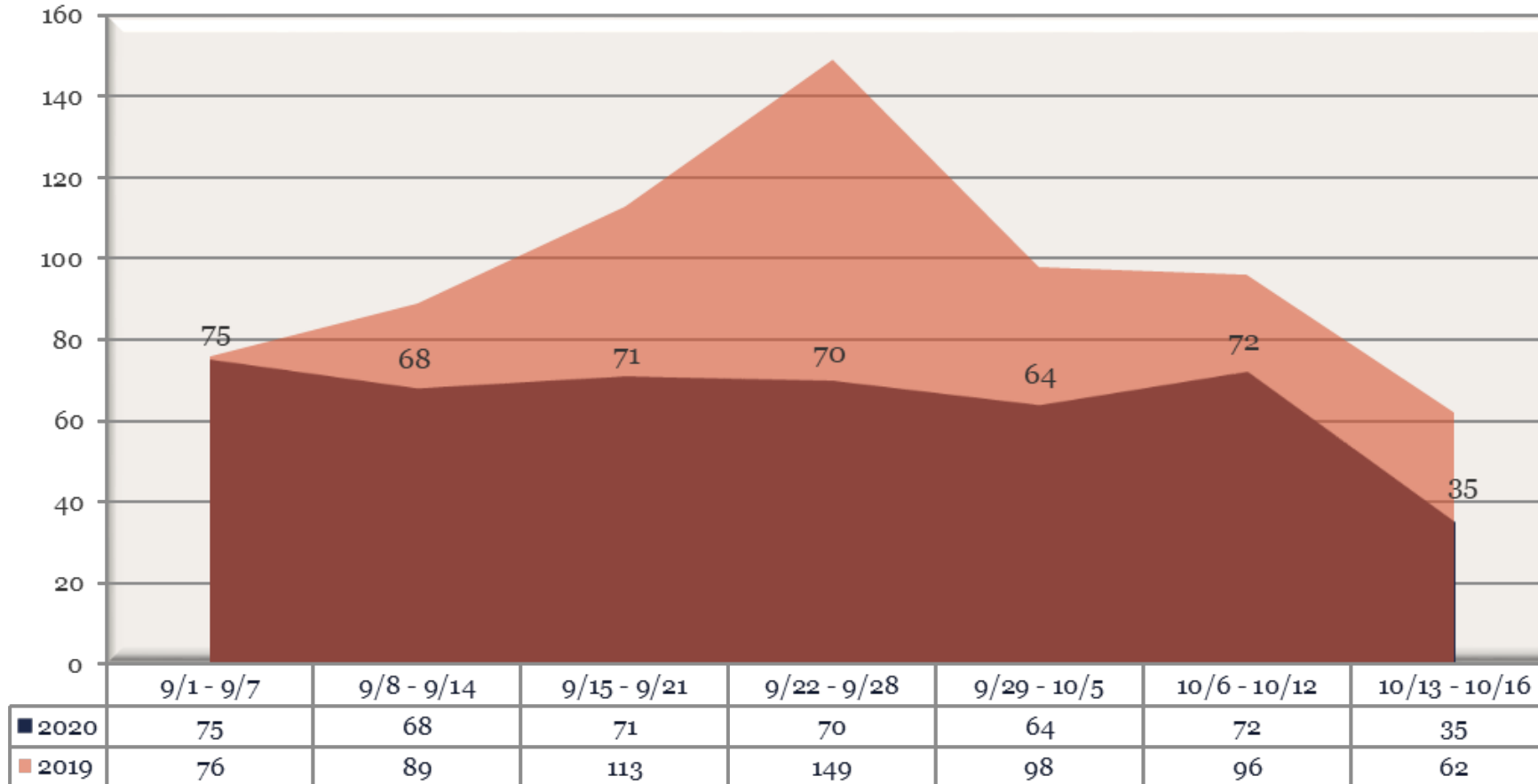


SCU Footprint





SCU Calls for Service

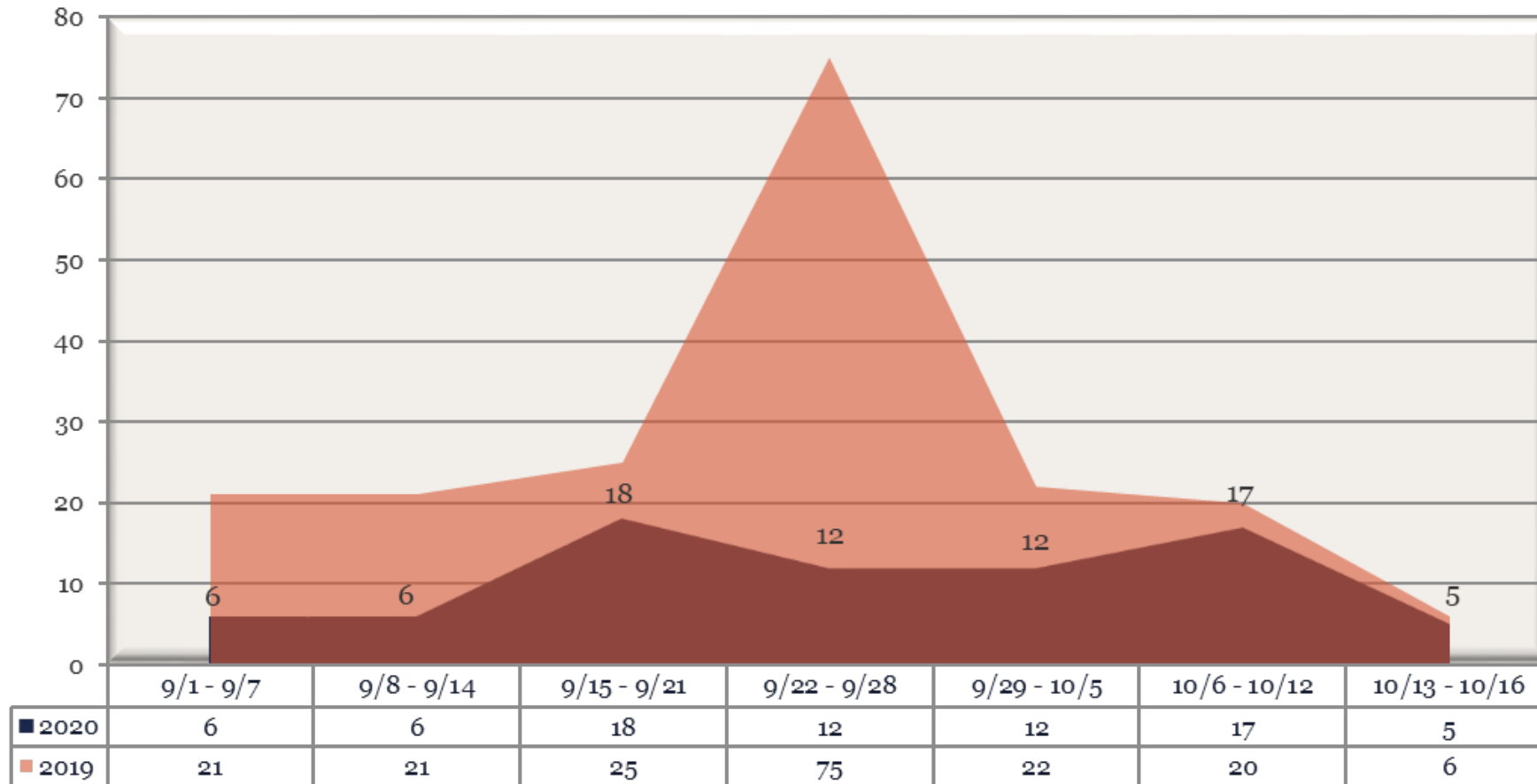


TOP 3 CALLS FOR SERVICE TYPES (2020): 1) SCU Party 2) Vehicle Stop 3) Meet With Citizen

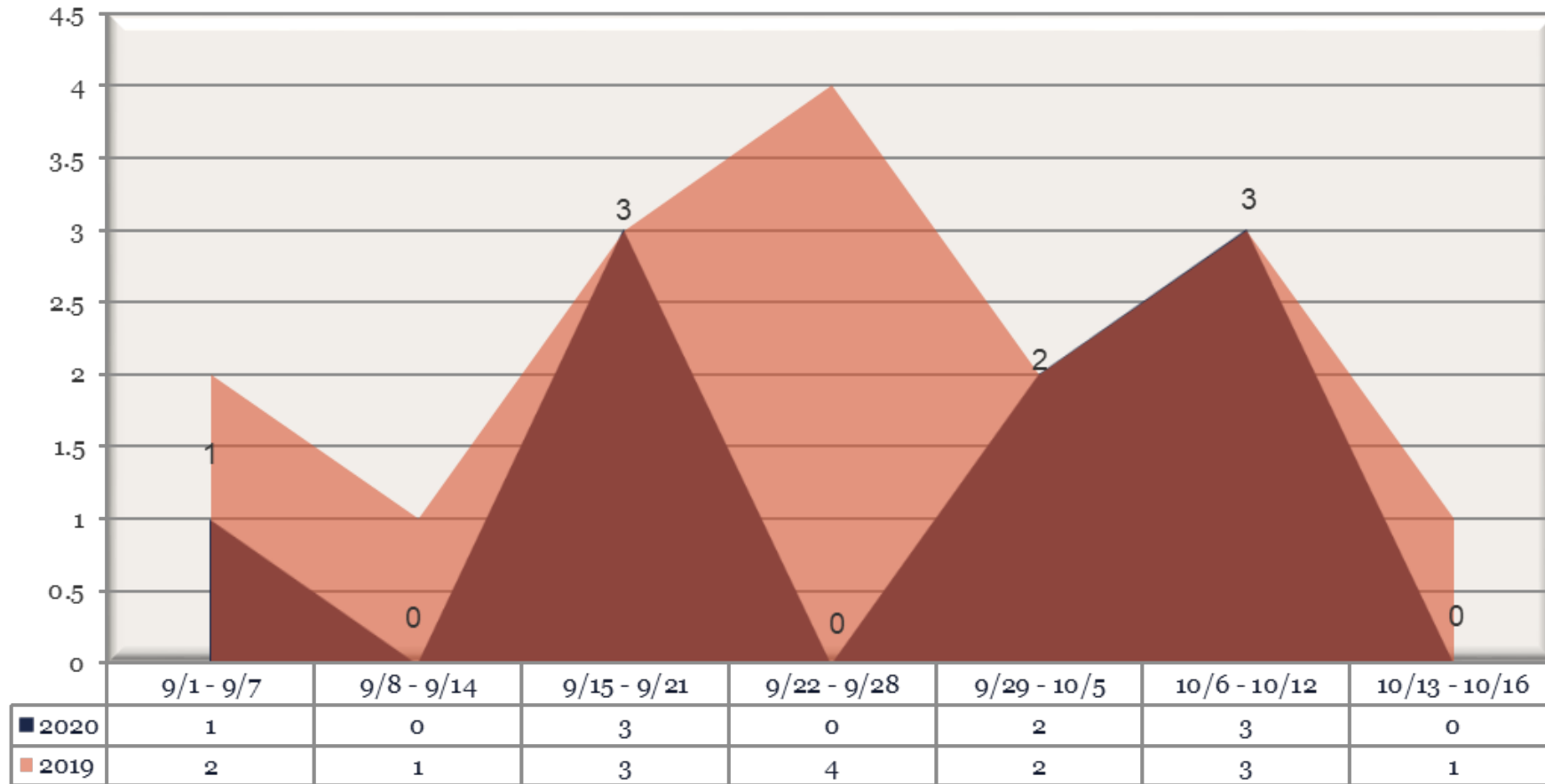


TOP 3 INCIDENT TYPES (2020): 1) MC 1st Res 2) Runaway 3) Towed Vehicle
