The time limit within which to commence any lawsuit or legal challenge to any quasi-adjudicative decision made by the City is governed by Section 1094.6 of the Code of Civil Procedure, unless a shorter limitation period is specified by any other provision. Under Section 1094.6, any lawsuit or legal challenge to any quasi-adjudicative decision made by the City must be filed no later than the 90th day following the date on which such decision becomes final. Any lawsuit or legal challenge, which is not filed within that 90-day period, will be barred. If a person wishes to challenge the nature of the above section in court, they may be limited to raising only those issues they or someone else raised at the meeting described in this notice, or in written correspondence delivered to the City of Santa Clara, at or prior to the meeting. In addition, judicial challenge may be limited or barred where the interested party has not sought and exhausted all available administrative remedies.

If a member of the public submits a speaker card for any agenda items, their name will appear in the Minutes. If no speaker card is submitted, the Minutes will reflect "Public Speaker."

In accordance with the requirements of Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 ("ADA"), the City of Santa Clara will not discriminate against qualified individuals with disabilities on the basis of disability in its services, programs, or activities, and will ensure that all existing facilities will be made accessible to the maximum extent feasible. REPORT TO SENIOR ADVISORY COMMISSION

SUBJECT

Senior Advisory Commission FY2020/21 Work Plan and Goals Discussion and Update

BACKGROUND

At the beginning of each fiscal year, the Senior Advisory Commission develops a Work Plan and Goals to focus discussion and Commission effort throughout the year. The City of Santa Clara completed a Senior Needs Assessment in 2017. The Assessment considers the eight (8) domains of the World Health Organization's Age-Friendly City, discussing current trends relating to the senior population and prioritizing community needs given limitations of available resources. The eight (8) domains include: Economics and Employment; Community; Housing; Outdoor spaces and Buildings; Transportation and Streets; Health, Wellness, and Nutrition; Social and Civic Engagement; and, Access to Community resources and information. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Commission did not meet in the months of March through August 2020.

The Commission made minor adjustments and adopted the FY2020/21 Work Plan goals and activities below.

- 1. Foster an Age-Friendly Community -
 - A. Increase monthly communication about virtual Senior Advisory Commission meetings, the monthly Senior Center Newsletter, Nextdoor, and Parks & Recreation Facebook.
 - B. Educate the Older Adult community about "How to Zoom" and provide two (2) workshops and two (2) Senior Center Newsletter articles before May.
- 2. Advocate for Affordable Convenient, and Safe Transportation and Streets -
 - A. Evaluate the feasibility (strengths, weakness, opportunities, and challenges) of various transportation options including a shuttle service in Santa Clara.
- 3. Develop Opportunities to Promote Health, Wellness, and Nutrition -
 - A. Educate older adults on trending health topics through bi-annual Senior Center Newsletter articles and bi-monthly Zoom Education Presentations.
- 4. Access to Community Resources and Information -
 - A. Host virtual "Be Strong, Live Long" Health & Wellness Fair May 2021
 - B. Provide Elder Fraud Prevention awareness through virtual educational workshops three (3) times a year.
 - C. Send one (1) representative to attend the City's ADA Committee meeting.

- Goal 4.a. Update on the progress and plans for the Health & Wellness Fair;
- Goal 4.b. Update on the progress for upcoming Elder Fraud Prevention virtual workshops; and,
- Goal 4.c. Report from the last City ADA Committee meeting.

Background: The Senior Advisory Commission (SAC) develops a work plan and goals to focus the SAC efforts throughout the year. In 2017, the City of Santa Clara adopted the World Health Organization's Age-Friendly City and completed a Senior Needs Assessment (SNA). The SNA considers the eight (8) domains of the World Health Organization's Age-Friendly City to help focus SAC efforts to address seniors needs in priority areas/domains. This includes the domains of: Economics and Employment; Community; Housing; Outdoor spaces and Buildings; Transportation and Streets; Health, Wellness, and Nutrition; Social and Civic Engagement; and, Access to Community Resources and Information.

Subcommittees were developed to focus SAC attention on four of the domains. Transportation and Streets became an area of interest and focus for discussion, beginning with the Senior Needs Assessment. The SAC reviewed the Assessment results regarding transportation and learned about shuttle services and funding strategies supported in other cities in Santa Clara County. The SAC recognizes that Transportation involves agencies and resources beyond the capacity of the SAC and is therefore interested in broadening the conversation within the City to better understand the size/scope of the issue (senior transportation), current public and private programs/services and available funding sources addressing the need, and the remaining service gap in Santa Clara.

The SAC subcommittee on transportation has drafted the "interest letter" below with the intent of requesting City Council prioritization of the issue so that additional staff resources can be allocated to study and analyze the current transportation resources and potential need for additional transportation and/or shuttle services in the City.

Dear City Council:

The Senior Advisory Commission (SAC) is committed to making a positive impact on the lives of seniors in Santa Clara.

The SAC has reviewed the most recent Senior Needs Assessment and are addressing several issues within our scope through workshops and information disemination as the current situation (pandemic) allows. The most pressing need identified for Santa Clara seniors is for more and better transportation.

The public transportation option in Santa Clara is limited to VTA which has been reducing service not enhancing it. We have been in conversations with our peers in other cities and have learned that virtually all of our neighboring cities, throughout the peninsula are providing specialized, frequent, affordable transportation within their boundaries for their citizens. It is our understanding that these services can

often be funded partially or completely with grants. We request the Mayor and City Council put transportation on the work plan for the coming year with the goal of providing local transportation to all citizens.

This would be a direct benefit to the seniors of Santa Clara and would; serve the needs of all citizens for short trips, reduce local traffic, and significantly reduce carbon emissions.
