

- Services: Gardening, walking paths, community space



Interim Housing

- Project Name: Bella Vista Inn Phase I
- Developer: RCD
- Clients Served: Individuals experiencing or at-risk of homelessness
- Total Units: 43 ELI: 43
- Services: Case management, counseling, social services, employment



Permanent Supportive Housing

- Project Name: Calabazas Apartments
- Developer: Allied/ABODE
- Clients Served: Individuals experiencing homelessness
- Total Units: 145 ELI: 80 VLI: 65
- **Services:** Case management, social services, job assistance, financial literacy, computer training, health education



Challenges for Extremely Low-Income Development

- Deep affordability requires more funding per unit
- Funding is limited:
 - Affordable Housing Ordinance does not produce much ELI
 - No formal city policy to prioritize funding for ELI development
 - Measure A funds are nearly used up
- Sites near basic services like food, shopping, transit, jobs

Challenges for Permanent Supportive Housing

- Neighborhood opposition to specific supportive housing sites:
 - Proximity to homes, schools, and certain land uses
 - Security
 - Parking and traffic
 - Density and physical design
 - Responsiveness of property management
- Supportive housing needs a variety of services to operate effectively (social workers, mental health and behavioral health clinicians, etc.)
- Supportive housing can have a higher impact on Police and Fire services



Feedback from City Staff

- Police
- Fire
- Parks & Recreation

Feedback from City Staff

- Noticing more people with severe mental illness and substance abuse issues. Staff is not equipped and is concerned about safety at work.
- A need for more outreach/social workers
- Santa Clara lacks a "one-stop" service provider like Sunnyvale Community Services

Feedback from City Staff (Con'd)

- A need for better communication with local and regional service providers and the County
- Increased trash, bio waste, graffiti, fires, vandalism generate expenses for clean-up & repairs at City facilities
- Limited accountability for crime due to legal reforms
- Staff's ability to do more is constrained by the City's budget




Community Forum Key Takeaways

- Need more community education about what homelessness looks like, what resources are available, and what are the reasons people end up unhoused.
- Address the impacts of unsheltered homelessness
- Increase supply of housing and services that are within the City's control.
- Address hesitancy to accept services.
- Need for more localized services located within the City and available to people in the City.
- Target housing & services to especially vulnerable subpopulations.




