Each sub-committee provided an update to the Senior Advisory Commission for discussion on the efforts and progress toward accomplishing the FY2022/23 Work Plan & Goals.

1. Advocate for Affordable and Convenient Housing -Commissioners Hubbard & Freitas.

Goal 1.a. Report on the last Housing Commission meeting - no meeting was held. Commissioner Freitas held a meeting with the City Housing Manager to learn about upcoming housing development projects for Seniors.

Goal 1.b. Report on presentation and article updates for older adult/ affordable and convenient housing projects in Santa Clara - **Commissioner Hubbard** is hoping to offer a workshop at the Senior Center and is working with Health & Wellness Coordinator Von Kugelgen; they discussed existing resources for older adults.

- Commissioner Drozek reported that he attended the meeting. He shared that the committee discussed pedestrian crossings that are high risk for older adults, including additional overhead signage/ lighting. Commissioner Drozek reported that he and Commissioner Freitas went around Santa Clara looking at existing crossings. An area of concern shared with the committee was the bike crossing at Monroe and Eddie Souza Community Garden & Park, as well as safe solutions that other cities provide for pedestrians.

STAFF REPORT

Recreation Manager commented on the following:

- The Senior Center BBQ was held on September 22. Thank you to those who were able to attend.
- There is continued outreach for Senior Center Membership, which begins October 3.
- The outreach for a Related Santa Clara 4.3-acre park on Stars and Stripes Drive at the old golf course is underway through an online survey. The City is seeking input on what the community would like to see in the space.
- The City is getting close to taking ownership of the parks in the Nuevo Development on Lawrence Expressway and Kifer.
- The Art and Wine Festival was a success, celebrating the 40th year. Even with the rain on Sunday, attendees enjoyed themselves.
- The City received estimates for the fire mitigation at Eddie Souza Park Building; City is evaluating next steps for the project.

COMMISSIONERS REPORT

Commissioner Freitas shared that he talked with an individual in the Housing and Community Services Division and also talked with individuals at Liberty Towers in a meeting regarding housing for older adults. He also shared that there's concern with the term low income, and also commented on the use of Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs).

Commissioner Sterling shared that she looked into the RYDE Program for older adults. The cost ranges from \$.90 - \$90.00. She is interested in providing transportation for older adults to get from their home to the Senior Center.

Commissioner Drozek noted that there was an event that coincided with the Senior Advisory Commission meeting. He suggested that meetings/trainings shouldn't conflict to allow commissioners to attend.

Commissioner Hubbard shared that she volunteered both days at the Art and Wine Festival.

Commissioner McCauley shared that he and his wife attended the Art and Wine Festival and congratulated the Parks & Recreation staff for the event.

COUNCIL PILLAR

Enhance Community Engagement and Transparency Enhance Community Sports, Recreational and Arts Assets

BACKGROUND

Using the results from the 2017 Senior Needs Assessment and taking into consideration the eight (8) domains of the Age-Friendly City guidelines. Age-Friendly City domains include: Economics and Employment; Community; Housing; Outdoor Spaces and Buildings; Transportation and Streets; Health, Wellness, and Nutrition; Social and Civic Engagement; and Access to Community Resources and Information. The Senior Advisory Commission prioritized the interests and needs of older adult residents of Santa Clara ages 50 and over given limitations of available City resources, and finalized the goals and work plan at the August 22, 2022 meeting and adopted as follows:

- 1. Advocate for Affordable and Convenient Housing Commissioners Hubbard & Freitas.
 - a. Appoint representative(s) to attend the Housing Commission meeting.
 - b. Research the Housing page of the City's website.
 - i. Disseminate information to the older adult population via two (2) presentations at the Senior Center (November and April) and provide one article for the Senior Center newsletter (February).
- 2. Encourage and Promote the use of Outdoor Spaces and Buildings Commissioners Freitas & Sterling.
 - a. Participate in public design phase discussions of new park facilities and spaces, including park improvement projects. Monitor the Parks & Recreation Commission for outdoor spaces in development that may enhance outdoor recreation for older adults.
 - b. Provide organized activities at the Senior Center
 - i. Billiard tournament (February)
 - ii.Bean Bag Toss (April)
- 3. Advocate for Affordable, Convenient, and Safe Transportation and Streets
 - a. Monitor public conversations regarding City of Santa Clara's transportation needs and the Council's proposed solutions. *Commissioners Hubbard & Toledo.*
 - i. Monitor and report monthly to Commission regarding planning phases of the VIA Shuttle
 - b. Review and provide feedback to the Pedestrian and Bicycle Master Plans for potential access improvements, and provisions for general safety and develop strategies to address excessive speeding on bike paths. Commissioners Drozek, Hohenshelt & Freitas.
 - Send representative(s) to attend Bicycle & Pedestrian Advisory Committee meeting.
